MINUTES

CALL TO ORDER/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

Authority Board Chairman Durst called the Joint Authority Board (AB) and Reservoir Committee (RC) Meeting to order at the hour of 9:00 a.m., followed by Roll Call and the Pledge of Allegiance.

ROLL CALL/ATTENDANCE:

The role of the Authority Board equaled 6 members in attendance, which resulted in a quorum.

The role of the Reservoir Committee equaled 19 representatives, 88.63% in attendance, which resulted in a quorum.

Director Sutton was seated at 10:19 a.m. during discussion item 3.3.

INTRODUCTIONS:

The Sites Staff, Consultants, and members of the public introduced themselves.

AGENDA APPROVAL:

It was moved by Director Evans, seconded by Director Allen to approve the April 21, 2023, Joint RC, and AB Meeting Agenda. **Motion carried unanimously.**

ANNOUNCEMENT OF CLOSED SESSION:

Counsel Doud announced the Authority Board of Directors, and the Reservoir Committee Members would consider Closed Session matters 5.1 & 5.2.

PERIOD FOR PUBLIC COMMENT:

Authority Board Chairman Durst called for a period of public comment. Hearing none, he closed the period for public comment.

1. CONSENT AGENDA:

Reservoir Committee Chair Pryor and Authority Board Chair Durst made time to consider consent agenda items 1.1 through 1.3 as follows:

- 1.1 Reservoir Committee and Authority Board consider approval of March 17, 2023, Joint Reservoir Committee and Authority Board Meeting Minutes.
- 1.2 Reservoir Committee and Authority Board consider acceptance of the Sites Project Authority Treasurer's Report.
- 1.3 Reservoir Committee and Authority Board consider approval of the Payment of Claims.

<u>ACTION RC</u>: It was moved by Cheng, seconded by Vanderwaal to approve Consent Agenda Item Numbers 1.1 through 1.3. **Motion carried unanimously**.

<u>ACTION AB</u>: It was moved by Director Allen and seconded by Director Parker to approve Consent Agenda Item Numbers 1.1 through 1.3. **Motion carried**: All Directors present voted yes.

2. <u>ACTION ITEMS:</u>

None.

3. DISCUSSION AND INFORMATION ITEMS:

3.1 Review and comment on the Final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)/Environmental Impact Report (EIR), Part 3 status briefing in preparation for approval of the Project.

Ms. Forsythe referred to the PowerPoint on the Final EIR/EIS Status Briefing and discussed the following:

- Determination of Impacts, as a lead agency under California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), must consider the direct and indirect impacts of the project, determined by comparison to baseline physical conditions. Impact determinations include no impact, less than significant impact, less than significant with mitigation, and significant and unavoidable impact.
- Significant and unavoidable impact cannot be fully mitigated to less than significant. A statement of overriding consideration is needed to show why the project is willing to accept the significant and unavoidable impacts in exchange for the benefit of the project.
- Surface Water Quality, significant and unavoidable impacts include increased methylmercury concentrations downstream of Sites Reservoir.
- Geology, Soils, Paleontology, Final decision documents will make the transition between TRR East to TRR West which will eliminate significant and unavoidable impacts.

- Refinement to Best Management Practices, construction traffic considerations, minimizing traffic for school safety, and generating traffic for local businesses. Mitigation implementation strategy to clearly identify how all mitigation measures will be implemented and extensive Cultural Resource and Tribal Cultural Resource programs will be implemented.
- Final EIR Certification targeted for August 2023. This includes a Board Hearing, Adoption of Findings, Statement of Overriding Considerations and Mitigation, Monitoring, and Reporting Program, and Decision to Approve Project.

Cheng confirmed with Ms. Forsythe that the efforts to manage methylmercury in the Sites Reservoir would still count even if the actions to manage methylmercury proved to be unsuccessful.

Ms. Forsythe explained the bioaccumulation of methylmercury and noted there are State requirements that would require postings of methylmercury depending on the levels of methylmercury found and Methylmercury isn't unique to the Sites Reservoir, but due to advanced research, Sites will try to reduce the amount of methylmercury as much as possible.

A discussion was held on mitigation implementation strategy, the importance of construction mitigation measures, and the timeline for agreement of core competencies as an agency before the final Benefits and Obligations Contract.

Kunde asked about the adoption of the EIS and Ms. Forsythe explained that RC & AB will adopt the EIR and make findings from a CEQA perspective and the Bureau of Reclamation will evaluate the final EIS and determine a Record of Decision (ROD).

A brief discussion continued about the timeline of the EIR/EIS and the ROD.

PERIOD FOR PUBLIC COMMENT:

Chairman Durst called for an additional period for public comment at 9:44 a.m. to give an opportunity to address the EIR/EIS. Hearing none, he closed the additional period for public comment.

Chairman Durst expressed the importance of educating others on the awareness of Sites Reservoir based on new information instead of the past version of Sites Reservoir before all issues were addressed.

3.2 Review and comment on modeled conveyance and storage losses and confirm the active storage assumptions.

Ms. Bezzone referred to the Reservoir Losses and Available Storage PowerPoint and discussed the following:

- Sites Project Facilities, Sites Flow Path, Modeled Losses, Diversions, Reservoir losses, and Release for Storage Partners losses.
- Confirmation of Available Storage, Dead Pool Considerations, and Potential Water Quality Constraints.
 - Operations & Engineering (O&E) Workgroup developing the language for an approach to allow for real-time management of potential constraints.
- Available storage allocation to storage partners is 1.41 million acre-feet (MAF) which includes recent survey refinements and assumes a 60 thousand-acre-foot (TAF) dead pool.

Discussion was held on the average annual release numbers confirming that releases factor in all upstream losses, and estimates for deliveries that factor in downstream conveyance losses. It was noted the calculation is not just a one-time percentage, it's applied each year.

Ms. Forsythe confirmed the storage policy does not state daily but specifies that losses are allocated proportionally based on the amount of water in storage. She explained that creek water is to be allocated to Colusa County and if their storage is full, it is allocated to all other members in portion to their investment.

Executive Director Brown noted that the current modeled project performance assumes that creek water is not counted as storage water so if there is any actual accumulation of creek water in the reservoir, the unused diversion capacity would be available to all other participants.

Chairman Dust expressed appreciation to O&E Workgroup for all their hard work.

3.3 Review allocations of storage space and proportionate shares of diverted water for participants based on conditional State and Federal participation.

Ms. Bezzone presented the Allocations of Storage Space PowerPoint and spoke to the following:

- Reclamation allocated change in active storage and total storage allocation is currently 128 TAF (9%). The state of CA remains unchanged at 244 TAF (17.3%).
- Local Partner Amendment 3 participation remains unchanged, with preliminary equation to establish storage allocation for local partners applied: Existing participation x 6.234 = Storage Allocation.
- Transition from annualized supply to storage allocation.
- Allocation of Active Storage, water diverted will be allocated to each storage partner's storage space proportional to its storage allocation.

Kunde requested data on different yield ranges prior to stage 3 to show members how much water they would receive for different operation scenarios based on year types.

Executive Director Brown explained that variations in demand patterns guide the output of assumptions in formulating yield numbers, so If there is a desire to look at ranges, participants need to provide alterations in the assumed demand patterns.

Ms. Forsythe noted the current modeling can provide a summary based on averages from different years including dry years, but to vary the demand assumptions it would require sensitivity modeling. The model itself does not have the capacity to use data for each individual participant, but it can provide data for groups of participants in each bucket.

Vasileva proposed that participants receive an example of volume diverted and losses assessed to show the net volume that each participant will be allocated.

Richard Welsh from the Bureau of Reclamation expressed appreciation for the efforts made on additional Federal participation and reported that Reclamation is continuously looking to increase investment to 16 % and working at various levels to make sure that investment is available when commitment is needed.

3.4 Receive an update on the status of Amendment 3 2023 cash call funds received to date.

Executive Director Brown stated 100% of the Reservoir Committee cash call funds have been received and Authority Board is in the process of completion.

4. REPORTS:

4.1 Chairpersons' Reports:

RC Chair Pryor noted she will be attending the open house at the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) conference in May and encouraged other agencies to attend.

4.1 <u>Committee & Workgroup Chairpersons' Reports</u>:

Operations & Engineering Workgroup:

Kunde reported that discussions held at the O&E meeting on April 12, 2023, included losses and reservoir storage, project baseline schedule and opportunities for acceleration, improving construction road access to reduce local impacts, and providing staff with input on types of information that may be useful for the upcoming soft call process.

Legislative & Outreach Committee:

Mr. Spesert reported on the State Legislative Day on March 20, 2023, noting 9 meetings were held throughout the day, the Washington DC trip is planned for the week of April 24, 2023, with 18 anticipated meetings, and the planned ACWA Region 2 Tour in Maxwell on June 1, 2023.

Director Evans reported there was great participation at the Local Community Working Group held on March 23, 2023, but still hoping for more attendance from local businesses.

Land Management Committee:

Mr. Spesert noted there is currently a lot of Geotech work happening, discussions with landowners for future Geotech work, and a possible Land Management Committee Meeting in May.

Director Evans welcomed Kunde to join the Land Management Committee given his expertise in a variety of fields. Chairman Durst expressed that Kunde would be useful to the Land Management Committee because he is very trustworthy, and Director Sutton agreed that Kunde would be a great asset to the committee.

4.3 Authority Board & Reservoir Committee Participant Reports:

Azevedo pointed out that Wilkins Slough was still at a little over 11,000 cfs.

Bettner spoke to the Pulse Flow Study that is supposed to take place this year and noted that type of study is what drives diversion criteria.

4.4 Executive Director's Reports:

Executive Director Brown spoke to the following:

- Water Right critical path delay, Primary Roster, Wilkins Slough and ACWA Conference.
- Washington DC Legislative visit primary messages include Support for Reclamation to fund a bigger share of the Sites Project, Legislative Staff preparation and understanding of the Final EIR approval, understanding of the Water Right application, and Sites integrating with various statewide considerations.
- Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) accepted the Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) application, California Independent System Operator (CAISO) application was accepted, Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) exemption was completed and confirmed that all the hydropower generated from releases will be exempt.

Authority Board Chairman Durst declared a recess at 10:35 a.m. and convened into Closed Session at 10:45 a.m.

5. CLOSED SESSION:

- 5.1 Negotiations concerning Sites Project operation terms, conditions and agreements with the United States Fish & Wildlife Service and the National Marine Fisheries Service (Govt. Code §§54956.9(c)).

Chairman Durst adjourned Closed Session at 11:32 a.m. and reconvened into Open Session.
