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Sites Reservoir Awarded Additional \$205.6 Million in Federal Funding to Improve Western Water Infrastructure

Maxwell, CA – This week, Congress approved the Bureau of Reclamation's recommendation to award the Sites Reservoir Project (Project) \$205.6 million in federal funding federal funding from the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act (WIIN Act), which provides grants to improve water infrastructure throughout the United States. This funding for Sites is the largest single WIIN Act award for a storage project in history.

"With the support of the Biden-Harris administration, Reclamation continues to make historic investments in Western water infrastructure projects like Sites Reservoir," said **Commissioner Camille Calimlim Touton**. "This project reaffirms Reclamation's partnerships with the State of California and the Sites Project Authority, as well as our ongoing commitment to increase drought resiliency in California and across the West."

Sites Reservoir will increase water supply throughout California and provide, for the first time, environmental benefits by storing water specifically to support native wildlife and their habitat during drought periods. The Project will provide an additional 1.5 million acre-feet of storage capacity, substantially improving the state's water flexibility, reliability, and resiliency in drier years.

Last summer, Sites Reservoir was <u>awarded \$30 million in funding</u> from the Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. With this investment, the project has received \$379.3 million from the WIIN Act and \$60 million from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, for a total of \$439.3 million in federal contributions to date. This amount covers the current estimated capital cost of the currently allocated 9% participation planned for Reclamation's use. The Authority will continue to work with Reclamation on achieving their 16% participation goal as space in the reservoir becomes available and more funds are appropriated to the project.

"Sites Reservoir would not be possible without the support of our federal partners, especially the Bureau of Reclamation, who share our commitment to increasing statewide water flexibility and reliability," said **Fritz Durst, Chairman of the Sites Project Authority**. "Their continued investment builds on the momentum we've had this year and moves us one step closer to delivering these benefits to California's farms, communities, and environment."

Sites Reservoir has broad statewide support from cities, counties, water agencies, and irrigation districts throughout the Sacramento Valley, San Joaquin Valley, Bay Area, and Southern California which are working together to advance the Project. The Project is locally led by the Sites Project Authority, which is made up Sacramento Valley water districts, cities, and counties.

Sites is an off-stream reservoir proposed north of the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, where it would provide unique water supply and environmental benefits during dry periods, especially during extended drought.
